. I have finished reading Laroux's trilogy, To a Dubious Selvetion , which you so kindly gave me, and although you asked me to let you know what i though . of it, it would take a sizeable term paper to discuss it adequiely. It was detainly most rewarding and worthwhile. Anyway, a few random thoughts in passing Like any major work Leroux encompasses momentous themes (much of them cymbolicolly), such as Good vs. Evil or the coexistence of Good & Evil (a lo Marmon helville in <u>Silly Budd</u>) and Reelity vs. Illusion. Walgevonden appare to be a microcosm of the structure of South Africa and its society or perhaps the world. Look Silverstein accepts the situation for what it is, including his wifs's infidelity and the upsavory parts of life. It is interesting that he has his outlet and ploy for confession in his shouting out during the hissing noise in the steam room where nobody else can hear what he is confession. Henry Van Edan, the naive Sentile idealist who has come to marry Jook's daughter, has to be instructing in realities, and doesn't see his figurese Salon until he is aware of what Jock is teaching him. Ot is symbolic that Henry guesses wrong and dresses out of harmony, with the other guests at the nighttime parties of the Silversteins. Henry, after Salome's death, adjusts in becoming a dustrinaire protector of Walgevonden, which gives him purpose and

Adam Kodman Van Edan-Silverstein, Henry's giantidiot son, represents parhops the decay of the ruling class in the dumb unawareness of his accidental killing by brute strangth -- an action similar to Zmhax Lanny in John Steinbeck's Of Mice and Men. Seargent Demosthenes de Goede, seemingly a counterpart of both Adam and Henry, is the protector of the society and of law and order against crime, but in his purity and goodness is inarticulate and stammering -- thus sympolic of the "Dubious Salvation".

I find Leroux's style reminiscent of the ethereal, shadowy, intuitive world of Hessa and Kafka, in which imaginings and real happanings flow together and remain indistinguishable with sometimes the former eseming more plausible than the latter.

. So much for my thoughts . The book is a wonderful addition to my collection at home. I haven't gotten into the Quarterlies you have me yet, but they do leave me something to anticipate.
